- From the North: Take Route 219 South to Junction 948. Follow 5 miles through Kersey to MJ's Mini Mart. Make a right onto Greens Road. Follow 1.5 miles to a Y-Intersection, turn left onto ZDietz Road and travel 200 yards to the entrance.
- From the South: Take Route 255 North to Junction 948. Turn left onto Route 948. Continue 2.5 miles to MJ's Mini Mart. Turn left onto Greens Road. Follow 1.5 miles to a Y-Intersection, turn left onto Dietz Road and travel 200 yards to the entrance.

No animal exhibits are to be removed from the Fair prior to 9:30pm on Saturday August 12, 2023. Failure to comply will result in the forfeiture of premium award. All other exhibits are to be removed on Sunday August 13, 2023 between the hours of 10:00am-2:00pm. Any person wishing to donate their premium check to the Fair must sign the check over to the Fair. Premium checks are to be picked up at the Fair Office on Sunday August 13, 2023 between the hours of 10:00am-2:00pm. NO EXCEPTIONS. Unclaimed premiums will become the property of the Fair after 60 days. To receive your premium check by mail, please include a self-addressed stamped envelope during registration.

GENERAL RULES

1. All exhibitors agree to be bound by the rules and regulations of the Elk County Fair.
2. The Fair Board reserves the right to amend or add to these rules and regulations as its judgments may determine.
3. Reasonable care will be taken to protect all animals and exhibits on display from injury and damage, but the Fair is not in any way to be held responsible for accidents, loss or damage by water, fire and theft or otherwise, whatever may be the cause or extent of the damage or loss.
4. Premiums, as listed, may be given for meritorious exhibits. In cases where there is no competition, judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit is worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a ribbon or rosette.
5. It shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor to make known the proper name of the article or breed of livestock being entered, Any item entered improperly will be disqualified to receive a prize, but the judges will make the correct name on the entry tag for the benefit of the owner so that the same mistake in entering need not be made the second time.
6. Department Heads reserve the right to refuse any entry especially if it is believed that the exhibits were shown in previous years. Furthermore, the Department Heads reserve the right to bar from competition animals and products of decidedly inferior quality and those not possessing sufficient merit to warrant recognition. Department Heads may limit the number of entries per exhibitor.
7. The Fair Management may, at any time, order the removal of any exhibit or part of an exhibit in bad condition, sick, or unruly. The Department Head must notify exhibitors of any exhibits that have become unfit. After having done so, the chairperson may dispose of the exhibit at his or her discretion.
8. No animal exhibit may be removed before close of Fair on Saturday night unless permission from the Fair Board is granted prior to the Fair each year. This is a yearly permission, not a free standing permission. Any exhibitor doing so will forfeit their premiums.
9. All entries must have been grown, produced, or made since the last fair by the person whose name appears on the tag as exhibitor. Entries are not limited to Elk County residents. Any exhibitor may be required to prove ability to reproduce entry in any department in the presence of a qualified person.
10. All entries must be registered on the Sunday of fair week between the hours of 11:00am- 4:00pm in the exhibit hall. All livestock must be preregistered and a \$2.00 barn fee per hoofed animal must be paid prior to the week of the Fair.
11. All exhibits must be picked up between 10:00am-2:00pm on the Sunday immediately following the fair.
12. During judging, the buildings are closed to everyone except Fair Officials, judges, Pennsylvania Fair Fund Officials and attendants. Department Heads may enter exhibits in their own department. All livestock offered for premium must have been the property of the owner for 90 days or longer. Health papers are to be issued in the name of the exhibitor.
13. When on exhibition in the ring, each animal must be under halter in charge of owner or employee. The Fair will have stand by attendants available during the youth judging or showing.
14. Any artificial means used to change the form or shape of an animal will be disqualified from competition. Over fitting of cattle is discouraged.
15. Each exhibitor must furnish their own bedding and feed and must also see to the care of their animals.
16. Joint ownership is considered to be as one owner in accordance with registration papers.
17. No unauthorized peddling will be permitted on the grounds or in the vicinity.
18. Intoxication, disorderly conduct, or obscene conduct is strictly prohibited. No alcoholic beverages or illegal substances are permitted on the Fairgrounds.
19. Unsportsmanlike conduct is grounds for disqualification at the discretion of the official in charge.
20. No animals, except handicap assist animals or those being exhibited will be permitted on the fairgrounds.
21. The Fair management reserves the right to remove any person engaged in any type of unacceptable behavior. Unacceptable is purely at the discretion of the Fair Management. No refunds will be given to the person removed.
22. Any check returned to the Elk County Fair for non-sufficient funds will be charged a fee of \$50.00 for each occurrence. Cash will only be excepted after that for any other transaction to the Elk County Fair.

ELK COUNTY FAIR CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

The Elk County Fair has adopted the IAFE (International Association of Fairs and Expositions) National Code of Show Ring Ethics to curtail unethical, deceptive and fraudulent show ring practices. The Code can be found at www.IAFE.com OR contact any member of the Executive Board of the Elk County Fair and a copy will be mailed to you upon your request.

ANIMAL ENTRIES

Please read all rules before making animal entries. This includes the general rules, the rules specific to each Department, and the Code of Show Ring Ethics.



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ANIMAL HEALTH RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Exhibitors will be expected to display their animals as directed by the chairperson, to accept the stall assignment without controversy, to keep their animals in an attractive appearance, and cooperate with the department in every way that may serve to increase the educational value of the show.
2. Exhibitors of livestock must inform themselves as to when their stock will be judged. Stock must be in the ring promptly on call and a failure to comply with the order renders exhibitors liable to be ruled out of competing.
3. Decorations with ribbons or ornaments previously won by animals at show shall be prohibited until after the awards have been made in their respective classes by the judges.
4. Exhibitors must have all animals listed for competitions on the grounds Monday of Fair week. An exception is given to horses due to the fireworks display on Tuesday evening. Horses are required to be on the fairgrounds by noon on Wednesday of Fair week. All such animals shall remain on the premises until the Saturday of Fair week at 9:30pm.
5. The exhibitors will be expected to keep the space they occupy in a clean and sanitary condition and to remove all equipment promptly as the Chairperson may direct.
6. All livestock, excluding rabbits, must be preregistered by calling the livestock Department Head by the Monday prior to Registration Day. All hoofed animals (cattle, horses, swine, goats and sheep) will be subject to a \$2.00 per head barn fee.
7. Due to space limitations, the Fair reserves the right to refuse any and all entries.
8. All interstate animals exhibited at Pennsylvania Fairs must meet the Pennsylvania requirements and must be accompanied by an interstate health certificate to be eligible for entry.
9. Animal owner or caretaker's verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship form must be filled out for each animal.
10. Location of animals in the barn(s) will be determined by the livestock Department Head. No one individual shall choose a stall at his or her discretion.
11. The PA Department of Agriculture recommends that animals returning home from fairs be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for 2-4 weeks to help prevent the spread of disease.

DEPARTMENT 1-HEALTH RULES FOR HORSES

1. A certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of current year is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. All equine animals must test negative for EIA by an official test within 12 months prior to the opening date of exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than 6 months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until 6 months of age, with a second vaccination administered 2-4 weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. The certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the original rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR HORSES & PONIES SHOWN AT HALTER

1. Horses should not be on the fairgrounds until Wednesday due to the fireworks display on Tuesday night. A parent or guardian must be with a child and horse if the horse is present during the fireworks.
2. A horse will be considered grade if not a recognized registered breed listed and will be shown as grade.
3. A copy of registration papers, "negative Coggins" within the year, and proof of rabies vaccination are required with animal entry fee (barn fee) of \$2.00 per horse or pony. Fee is to be paid prior to the week of fair.
4. No stallions over 1 year of age will be accepted for entry.
5. All animals entered must compete and be shown.
6. Boots or shoes with a distinguishable heel must be worn while riding anywhere on the competition grounds.
7. All competitors age 18 and under are required to wear approved helmets when riding.
8. Exhibitors must be properly attired for the show ring to present their horse or pony in halter classes.
9. In no case is it permissible to show more than one breed in the same class to be judged against each other for premiums except for the Grand and Reserve awards.
10. All exhibitors shall furnish their own animal feed and all stalls must be cleaned by the exhibitor before leaving.
11. No sleeping in the horse barns will be permitted.
12. Entries must be on the grounds and stalled by 2:00pm on Wednesday, the week of the Fair.
13. Release time shall be 9:30pm on Saturday the week of the Fair. Failure to keep the animal stalled will result in forfeiture of premium.

DEPARTMENTS 2 & 3-HEALTH RULES FOR DAIRY AND BEEF CATTLE

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of the current year.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - A USDA-issued metal ear tag OR
 - A breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate OR
 - A breed registration ear tag if the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate OR
 - An ISO-compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID).
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

DEPARTMENT 4-HEALTH RULES FOR SHEEP

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of the current year is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
 - An official USDA scrapie ear tag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie ear tags at 1-866-873-2824 weekdays from 9:00am-5:00pm. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order your tags early. OR
 - A USDA approved custom scrapie ear tag OR
 - A USDA approved scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo) OR
 - An ISO compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID)
5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

DEPARTMENT 5-HEALTH RULES FOR SWINE

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1 of the current year is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual animal ID is required. ID options include the following:
 - A herd tattoo in combination with an ear notch OR
 - A USDA issued metal ear tag OR
 - An ISO compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID) OR
 - A plastic stamped ear tag (market hogs ONLY)

DEPARTMENT 6-HEALTH RULES FOR GOATS

1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2022 is required.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI.
3. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany each animal and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
 - An official USDA scrapie ear tag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie ear tags at 1-866-873-2824 weekdays from 9:00am-5:00pm. Your order may take several weeks for processing so order your tags early OR
 - An ISO compliant 15 digit ear tag (including RFID) OR
 - A USDA approved custom scrapie ear tag OR
 - A USDA approved scrapie tattoo. Goats with an official scrapie tattoo must also have a unique individual animal ID (tattoo) to meet the scrapie ID requirement OR
 - Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

DEPARTMENT 8-HEALTH RULES FOR POULTRY

1. All Pennsylvania poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds and pigeons entering an exhibition must bear a unique individual identification leg band (official state issued leg bands are not required). Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader).
2. An owner endorsed health certificate must accompany all Pennsylvanian poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, ratites and pigeons and must include the following:
 - Name and location of exhibition and
 - Name, address and telephone number of the owner and
 - A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of evidence of contagious diseases and
 - Owner signature and date of that signature.
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
4. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification. All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian.
 - All poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds and ratites (pigeons excluded) for exhibition must originate from a flock in good standing in the Pennsylvania Avian Influenza Monitored Flock program, or from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Avian Influenza Clean program (the flock must be on NPIP-it is not considered to be a clean flock if only coming from a clean breeder flock) and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent negative test report (copy acceptable). The NPIP or AI Mon. flock number must be noted on the report OR
 - The birds must originate from a flock in which a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested negative for avian influenza within 6 months prior to opening date of the exhibition and the birds must be accompanied by the negative test report (copy acceptable). If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For ducks and geese, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using virus isolation (ducks and geese) or PCR (ducks only techniques).
5. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (pigeons and waterfowl excluded). All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian.
 - All poultry, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons and waterfowl excluded) must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum Typhoid Clean Program or from a flock in good standing in the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent negative test NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks. If bird side testing was done, the 9-2 or state equivalent form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable) OR
 - Individual birds (pigeons and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the negative test report (copy acceptable). The following age restriction apply to comply with NPIP standards:
 - o Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older
 - o Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older
 - o Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
 - o Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
 - o All birds not meeting these age restrictions are exempt from pullorum testing requirements.

DEPARTMENT 9-HEALTH RULES FOR RABBITS

1. An animal owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) form must accompany all PA rabbits, and must be presented upon arrival at the exhibition.
2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.

DEPARTMENT 22-HEALTH RULES FOR DOGS AND CATS

1. A current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs 3 months of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed.
2. All rabies vaccinated dogs must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain legible name, contact information, and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.

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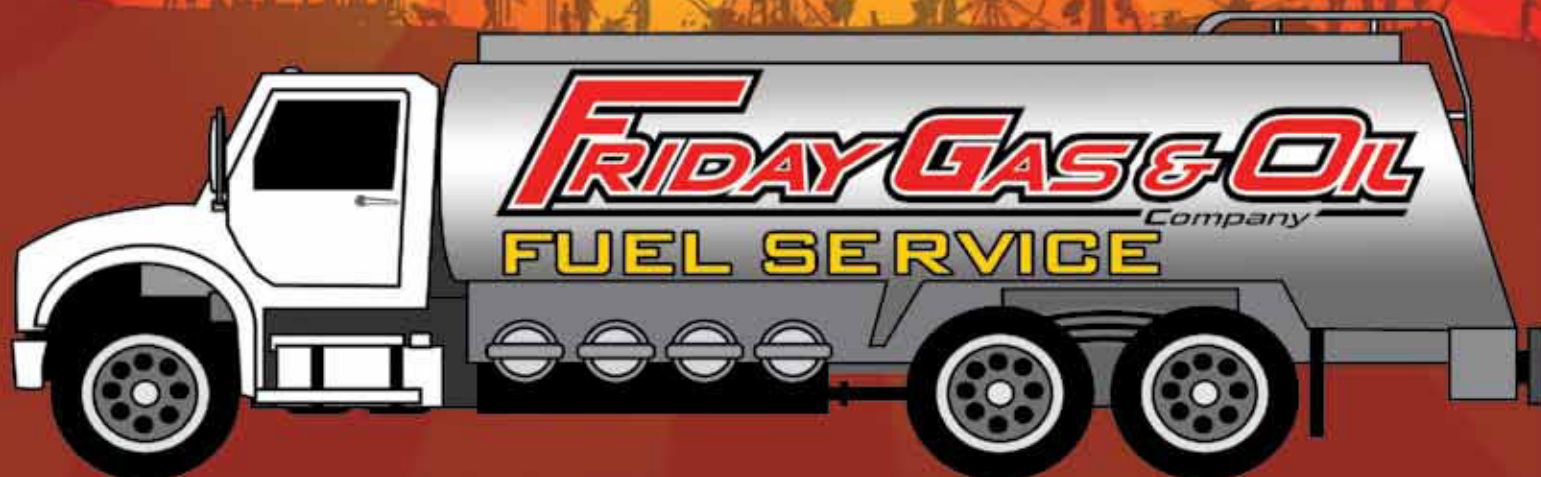
